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# KNOWLEDGE TRANSFER: A TOOL FOR DIASPORA ENGAGEMENT

ccording to OXFORD ADVANCE LEARNERS DICTIONARY OF CONTEMPORARY ENGLISH, Diaspora could broadly be defined as a population that originated in a land other than which it currently resides and whose social, economic and political networks are across the borders of nations.

The African Union also defines Diaspora as people of a particular origin living in another location irrespective of their citizenship and nationalilty and who are willing to contribute to the development of their host country and country of origin. The Draft National Diaspora Policy also defines a Diaspora Nigerian as a person who has lived abroad for at least a year, has verifiable address, living legally, holds a Nigerian Passport and is contributing to the SOCIO-ECONOMIC development of Nigeria.

Be that as it may, members of diaspora are able to make specific contributions deriving from the absence of language and cultural barriers, and more importantly, their ability to better understand and more effectively adapt foreign approaches and technology to their homeland. They are increasingly seen as resources for countries of origin and opportunity for effective knowledge transfer and capacity building.

It is mind blowing what diaspora members bring to the table: valuable skills, expertise and knowledge to their country of origin thereby making important and positive contributions. Evidence generally focus on economic contributions of remittances and investments, but there is increasing evidence of non-economic contributions to human rights, good governance, and capacity building.

In today's global economy, knowledge is the most important driver of productivity and economic

Knowledge transfer can be defined as a multistage process which includes the transmission of information by one individual or group and the absorption of said information by another individual or group. The value of knowledge lies in its impact on behaviors, policies, processes and practices within the recipient party. Knowledge transfer can be divided into two types: explicit and tacit knowledge. Explicit knowledge is that which is written and formally recorded, while tacit knowledge is the informal knowledge transferred through interpersonal methods such as learning by doing, mentoring, problem solving and team work.

Acquiring knowledge is a continuous process. Diaspora members may acquire new knowledge through employment, education and social connections in their host countries. As they remain connected to their countries of origin while abroad, they have the potential to transfer knowledge gained through transnational activities. This transferred knowledge can be commonly referred to as form of social remittances or brain Circulation, which can include norms, practices, identities, and social capital.

Within knowledge transfer it is recognized that trust and culture are critical elements, the difference in belief system, values, and practices between transferors and transferees could create barriers to knowledge transfer. It is therefore important to note that diaspora can play a special role in knowledge transfer and capacity building in their countries of origin where they are knowledgeable about local context and trusted.

#### **Knowledge/Brain Circulation**

Evidence has shown that diaspora organisations contribute to the development of their countries of origin by forming different associations, groups, networks to fill different gaps ranging from health,





women empowerment, children, water and sanitation, good governance and so on.

Some diasporas permanently return to their countries of origin after having lived in the host country for a significant period of time to properly follow up on achieving gaps by transferring their knowledge acquired abroad.

Diaspora members do not have to permanently return to countries of origin to transfer knowledge, they can transfer knowledge and skills through short visits. Government can launch programs to encourage temporary return to enable knowledge transfer from highly skilled diaspora members. This will be followed by series of policies and incentives making diaspora engagement important factor for the Nigerian Knowledge Economy. Examples of such international programs includes, UNDP's Transfer of Knowledge Through Expatriate Nationals Program (TOKTEN), International Organisation for Migration (IOM's) Migration and Development in Africa Program (MIDA),

Increased global connectivity and major improvements in information technology have enabled diasporas to maintain close contact with family and friends in their countries of origin.

Diasporas are therefore able to interact with people in their country of origin and transfer knowledge without physically returning home. This is referred to as virtual return. They can exchange letters, emails, videos, telephone and video calls and applications such as Facebook, Skype, WhatsApp facilitate cost effective knowledge transfer that come very close to faceto-face interaction.

However, it has been demonstrated that diasporas have the potentials to transfer important expert knowledge and technical and managerial skills and can change behaviors, lifestyles and notions.

But we must note that not all diasporas are highly skilled and at the same time, social remittances might discourage family members from investing their time in career development while living in the idealization of life abroad or diasporas transferring unfavorable norms and practices.

Conclusively, for engagement to take place, government must be ready to accept diasporas qualifications in the local labour market, matchmake them upon their arrival with relevant businesses, , establish strong labour laws and immigration policies and trade agreements. The diasporas on their part too must be willing to break barriers, put up right attitude, understand the peculiarity of their terrain since its their home country.

### **NIDCOM TO LAUNCH NEW MOBILE APP**

on. Abike Dabiri-Erewa, Chairman/CEO, Nigerians in Diaspora Commission (NIDCOM) has said the Commission would soon launch her first mobile application in April towards an effective communication.

Dabiri-Erewa made this known during a live US-based radio programme, "Yoruba Gbode", with Nigerians in the Diaspora through a virtual device.

She said the App would help in creating and maintaining relationships with Nigerians living abroad and also contribute to national development.

The NIDCOM boss added that there is also a plan to launch the first- ever online diaspora radio aimed at reaching out to the targeted audience by projecting the activities of Nigerians in the Diaspora.

On diaspora Voting, she advised Nigerians living abroad to lobby National Assembly to expedite action on its passage just as a Diasporan, Prince Ade Omole is using his personal resources through his NGO, Diaspora Voting Council, to campaign for its quick passage.

She added that the passage would enable Nigerians to make their own contributions to the political development in the country as being practised in many countries of the world.

Dabiri-Erewa equally advised Nigerians abroad to be good Ambassadors and law-abiding in their countries of abode, thus giving a positive image for Nigeria.

She reiterated the commitment of the Commission in celebrating deserving Nigerians when necessary as a way of encouraging others to do more.

According to her, "three out of many wonderful Nigerians in the Diaspora can not spoil the image of the country", urging all to keep the flag flying as President Muhammadu Buhari is always proud of Nigerians abroad.

On issuance of passports renewal for the Diasporans, she explained that all the complaints from all the stakeholders had been compiled and send to the immigration office in Nigeria for prompt response.

Other issues that dominated the three-hour session with Nigerians in Diaspora include procedure to get NIN, slow response to issues at Embassies and Missions abroad, maltreatment of Nigerians abroad, remittances and security in Nigeria.

Other issues discussed include the covid-19 protocols as it relates to Nigerians travelling home, data of all Diasporans and groups, creating Diaspora offices in missions abroad, issue of Nigerian culture and language, housing and tax holiday for Diasporans among others.

The programme hosted by Mrs Sola Yusuf, a renowned broadcaster, witnessed the participation of Nigerians abroad including Prof .Wande Abímboʻlá, former Vice Chancellor of University of Ife amongst other top professionals.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1. Akazi/Afang leaves
- 2. Water leaf (Spinach)
- 3. Palm oil
- 4. Beef, stock fish, dry fish, kpomo, chicken
- 5. Ground crayfish
- 6. Pepper, Onions
- 7. Salt/ stock cubes

#### **METHOD OF PREPARATION**

Slice the water leaf and set aside.

Slice Afang leaves, pound or blend it and set aside.

Tip: the dry leaves are tougher than the fresh leaves, so try to grind it as fine as you can.

1. Cook the assorted meat and stock fish with chopped onions, seasoning cubes and salt to taste until tender.

Then clean the dried fish in hot water, remove the bones and add the fish to the pot of cooked meat.

- 2. Add the palm oil, pepper, ground crayfish and remaining stock cube to the pot. Mix well then Cover the pot and leave to boil for about 10 minutes.
- 3. After 10 minutes, add the water leaf, allow to simmer for 3 minutes and then add the Afang leaves. Let it simmer for 3 minutes.
- 4. Add salt to taste, simmer for 2 minutes and your Afang Soup is ready.

Afang soup is usually enjoyed hot with Eba, Pounded Yam, Fufu, Semolina, Amala. The choice is yours to make.





# FG EVACUATES OVER 1000 STRANDED NIGERIANS IN SAUDI ARABIA BACK HOME

No fewer than 1000 stranded Nigerians were evacuated from Saudi Arabia by the Federal Government. The first batch of the returnees consisted of a total number of 384 persons including Males, Females and an infant. They arrived Nnamdi Azikiwe International Airport, Abuja via Saudi Air flight B773. The second batch which arrived a day after, consisted of 424 Nigerians. They were also at Nnamdi Azikiwe International Airport, Abuja and landed via Saudi Air Flight.

The third batch consisted of a total 420 stranded Nigerians, of which 27 were children and 393 adults. All returnees were received accordingly by a combined team of Senior Government officials of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Presidential Task Force on COVID-19, NCDC and other relevant agencies.

Speaking to the evacuees while receiving them, Amb. Bolaji Akinremi, Director, Consular and Legal Department, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, urged them to cooperate with the Government as provisions have been made for their basic needs during the mandatory 14 days isolation in linewith COVID-19 protocol.

All returnees were quarantined at the Federal Capital Territory Hajj camp for 14 days in line with the reversed COVID-19 protocols by the Presidential Task Force on Covid-19.

essica O. Matthews is a Nigerian-American inventor, CEO and venture capitalist. She is the co-founder of Uncharted Power, known for its invention of Soccket, a soccer ball that can be used as a power generator. Matthews is an alumna of the Harvard College and Harvard Business School.

Born on February 13, 1988 to a family of six, Matthews grew up in Poughkeepsie, New York. She is a dual citizen of the United States and Nigeria. In 2008 while in Junior college, Jessica and her classmate Julia Silvermann, invented the Soccket for an engineering class assignment. Matthew's inspiration was drawn from a trip to her Aunt's wedding to Nigeria. According to her, electricity was out and diesel generators were utilised through out.

She realised the health implications the fumes will cause and was inspired her to create Soccket. Matthews and Silver mann founded Uncharted Power to develop Soccket, with Matthews as CEO. The device works on a 30-min play of the soccer ball-like gadget, which stores kinetic energy that could power small attachable LED light for three hours.


Jessica Matthews has showcased her creation at the 2010 Clinton Global Initiative University and on President Barack Obama's 2013 trip to Tanzania.

# DABIRI-EREWA: MIGRATION IS A NATURAL PHENOMENON

It was a day packed with mind-stimulating takeaways as the National Defence College (NDC) organised its Course 29 in Abuja. Speaking to participants, as the guest lecturer, on "Migration, Diaspora and Africa's Development",

Hon. Abike Dabiri-Erewa, Chairman/CEO Nigerians in Diaspora Commission, (NiDCOM), described migration as a natural phenomenon that cannot be stopped. However, she asserted that managed migration must be encouraged, for positive impact on the migrants, the country of origin and the host country.

The NiDCOM Boss maintained that the Diaspora phenomena is the outcome of legitimate migration, hence the push for a regular (legal) migration as opposed to irregular (illegal) migration. Dabiri-Erewa stated, in her address that, Nigeria is now experiencing the 'feminisation of migration', a situation where more women are getting involved than men in labour migration. She said that the Nigerians in Diaspora Commission is in high level talks with countries, especially in Europe, to mainstream migration issues thereby resulting to a win-win position for both destination and departure countries.

The Chairman of the Commission stated that key drivers of migration include: security, economic, environmental, socio-political and other pull and push factors.

On Nigeria Diaspora population, Dabiri-Erewa said that an estimated 17 million Nigerians are scattered all over the world accomplishing excellent feats in medicine, health, technology and innovation, education, economy and many others both to their host countries and country of origin. In 2019 alone, Nigerians in Diaspora remitted about \$25billion dollars to shore up the economy.

She added that the Commission is ever ready to act as a bridge between Nigeria and its Diasporas to harness the abundant human capital, skills and



talents to build a formidable nation. The NiDCOM Boss also gave assurances that the Commission has its contact desks in International and Governmental agencies to liaise and speed up intervention processes.

Meanwhile, the Commandant of the National Defence College, Rear Admiral Makanju Mackson Kadiri, Gss, commended President Muhammadu Buhari for the wisdom in establishing NiDCOM, to cater for the needs of millions of Nigerians in the Diaspora.

The Commandant and participants also commended the NiDCOM CEO for her passion, dedication and commitment to duty and promised that the National Defence College will always be one of the frontier supporters of the Commission and its objectives.
